HISTORY

My Thoughts on the Evolution of AA.

(PART 1: What Came Before AA)

The life and recovery of the alcoholic have often been misunderstood and the active alcoholic (the drunk) is a source of great suffering to himself and everyone around him. As we shall see, the problem has always been around and until AA there has not been a readily available and lasting solution.

I am not going to tell you about the beginning of time, or references to the Bible, or the treatment of drunkards in other countries. I am going to tell you about alcoholism in these United States and how Alcoholics Anonymous got started in this country. I am going to describe how alcohol became a problem in this country from the nation's very beginnings and the many ways people tried to address that problem.

So how did we get from hopeless drunkenness to the possibility of living sobriety? Has alcohol abuse always been a problem and how was it dealt with? How did AA itself develop? What are its roots in history? And how have we nowadays advanced from going to our local AA gathering in town to logging onto a computer and Zooming all over the world for a meeting?

With questions like these in mind, I present to you a little history leading to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Native American tribes manufactured alcoholic drinks and used them and other mind-altering substances in ritual settings and rarely for personal enjoyment. Liquor for personal enjoyment was unknown until introduced by immigrant Europeans as an easily obtainable commodity. After the introduction of alcohol by the new arrivals, it was not long before alcohol abuse appeared in the native American population. *continued on page three*

In response to this abuse, various Native American tribes created 'Circles', or abstinencebased cultural revitalization movements to address alcohol abuse in their population. What most Native recovery movements shared was an expectation of personal sobriety, the use of ancestral teachings to anchor that sobriety, and a code of moral conduct. An example of these efforts was the Seneca Indian Chief, Handsome Lake (1735 to 1815). During a period of illness caused by his alcohol consumption, he experienced visions and shortly after ceased drinking. Handsome Lake began preaching against drunkenness and influenced large numbers of Seneca and Iroquois to abstain from alcohol.

Alcohol abuse was by no means limited to the native Americans and by the middle of the 19th century, as recognition of the problem of alcohol abuse increased, the temperance movement was in full sway across the United States. The movement was characterized by addressing the entire population and not just those who consumed alcohol. Public temperance meetings were frequent, and the main thrust was prohibition of alcohol and pledges of sobriety to be made by the individual. The influence of the temperance movement peaked with the passage of the 18th Amendment and the introduction of Prohibition to the United States (1920).

The increased awareness of alcohol abuse led to the creation later in the 19th century to a growing number of **institutions** established to treat individuals suffering from alcoholism. The first was the New York State Inebriate Asylum which admitted its first patient in 1864. Other institutions followed including Martha Washington in Chicago which specialized in treating women alcoholics and the Towns Hospital in New York City located adjacent to Central Park and established in 1901. Towns would thrive during the early part of the 20th century but suffered a decline with the establishment of prohibition. Towns and its later director, William Silkworth, would play a pivotal role in Bill W.'s recovery and the founding of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Next month we will look at two groups (The Washingtonians and the Oxford Group) that started during the temperance movement era and have influenced AA.

You can be just as crazy sober as you were when you were drunk, you'll just remember it the next day.


