The Grapevine first appeared in 1944 and soon was being called the "meeting in print." Personal stories have always been the heart of the Grapevine. There were also news and notes, book reviews and magazine reprints, and pieces written by non-AAs, including some well-known literary figures. Burning topics of the day were: the place of women in AA, returning veterans, and cross-addiction.

The Grapevine was in fact appealing to "alcoholics everywhere" and in 1945, at the request of the groups, it became the national journal of Alcoholics Anonymous. Four years later, when the Grapevine's readership had expanded to include members in Canada and Europe, it was named **The International Journal of Alcoholics Anonymous,** a designation which remains to this day.

HISTORY

THE BIG BOOK

The Big Book is the basic text of Alcoholics Anonymous, AA's guide on how to get and stay sober. Since its first appearance in 1939 more than 30 million copies have been sold. *Time* magazine judged it one the best and most influential books in English of the 20th century and the Library of Congress called it one of the "Books that Shaped America." The world-wide influence of the book is confirmed by its translation into more than 70 languages.

On April 10, 1939, a somewhat shaky, often fearful group of men and women somehow brought the book Alcoholics Anonymous to publication. In May 1938, when Bill W. began work on the first draft, he, Dr. Bob, and the other 100 original AAs had all been sober no more than a few years. Bill was to author what we now refer to the first as the "first 164 pages" with input from Dr. Bob and other members. In addition, the early members realized the book would need a "story" section. The stories would have a dual purpose: to allow the newcomer a way to identify with fellow alcoholics and to provide testimonials (evidence) to the effectiveness of the AA program. The Akron and New York AA groups wrote stories and in early 1939 the book was completed.

The book still lacked a title. The Akron and New York groups had been voting for months on possible titles. This had become an after-the-meeting form of amusement and a topic of great interest. The title 'Alcoholics Anonymous' had appeared early in the discussion, but we do not know who first used these words. After the New Yorkers had left the Oxford Groups in 1937, they often described themselves as a 'nameless bunch of alcoholics.' Perhaps from this "nameless bunch" it was a short jump to 'Alcoholics Anonymous.' Dozens of titles were considered, but in the end, it came down to Alcoholics Anonymous or The Way Out. At this point, one of the A.A.s visited the Library of Congress to research the number of books titled The Way Out versus those called Alcoholics Anonymous. There were 12 with the former title, none with the latter and the problem was solved. And so, the book got its name, and our society became known as Alcoholics Anonymous.

While the title of the book is actually Alcoholics Anonymous, members of AA fellowship affectionately refer to it as the Big Book. The story goes that it got that name from the physical size of the original book. Cornwall Press had been highly recommended to Bill Wilson, so Bill and Hank P. (author of the personal story "The Unbeliever" in the first edition of the Big Book) went to Cornwall to see the printer. There they were told that the book would probably be only about four hundred pages when printed. Since Bill & Hank had a price of \$3.50 in mind for the book (\$5 at that time would get you \$100 of goods today!) that seemed a bit skimpy. To make it seem *continued on page three*

that the buyer was getting their money's worth, they picked the cheapest, thickest paper the printer had and requested that each page be printed with large margins surrounding the text. This made for an unusually large book. Thus, the book came to be nicknamed the "Big Book."

A new edition of the Big Book (Alcoholics Anonymous) is in the works. The 2021 General Service Conference recommended that a Fifth Edition of the Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, be developed, including an update of stories to better reflect the current membership. Those working on the new edition were to keep in mind the 1995 Advisory Action stating that: "the first 164 pages of the Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, the Preface, the Forewords, The Doctor's Opinion, Dr. Bob's Nightmare, and the Appendices remain as is".

YOUR STORY IS NEEDED IN THE NEW EDITION OF THE BIG BOOK

A new edition of the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous is in the works. The guidelines on how to send in your story follow. The **Deadline is October 31, 2022.**

NOTE: You must attach a signed copy of the Copyright document form and send it with your submission. This is an important step; please make sure you return the completed form.

If you prefer to send your story by regular postal mail, here are the instructions: Postal Mail: Attn: Literature Assignment, 5th Edition BB, General Service Office, Box 459, Grand Central Station, New York, NY 10163

The words "5th Edition BB" should be written on the envelope and at the top of the first page of the manuscript.


Please be assured that your anonymity will be maintained if your story is selected for publication.



SEEK FORGIVENESS FOR MYSELF, 🙂 A HAPPY AND USEFUL WHOLE EGG!

Make a study of my past as to what I have learned not just about what I have suffered.

Feed the strengths learned from bad past, ultimately the strengths

will pull us through our weaknesses.

Self-evaluation is the jumping off point for personal growth. (I tend to look at myself through 100X magnification mirror at my enlarged pores, scars, lines, wrinkles and other imperfections. I need to remove the magnifying glass and accept wrinkles of my life as lessons learned.)

Choose your human environment. Everyone wishes for the basics of a healthy, loving, and happy family.

Plan ahead and figure out a new response where normally I would cry, yell, hit back, run, etc.

Choose to be Good. My life is not just about me but everyone I now touch.

Give others the benefit of the doubt.

Try to disable replay buttons.

Embrace my values, morals, ethics and religion.

Divine intervention and connectedness are feelings of being loved despite experiences or misbehaviors.

Tolerating the discomfort (gunfight at the OK Corral – peace comes at a price)

Facing up implies that I take responsibility; confrontation implies that they take responsibility.

Find compassionate benevolence. WORK, WORK, WORK.
