HISTORY



AA TRADITIONS

I have come to appreciate the role that tradition plays in the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. Tradition can be defined as the handing down of information, beliefs, or customs from one generation to another.

This "handing down" from one alcoholic to another is the very reason AA even exists. If Bill didn't get to meet Bob and pass on what he (Bill W.) had, we might not have AA today! But this "handing down" developed into something more than the exchange between one alcoholic to another — don't misunderstand this that exchange between individuals is critical — this "handing down" somehow grew through trial and error into group practice being passed on to the next generation of alcoholics, alcoholics who got sober through the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous and who will pass what they have learned to the next generation.

Almost everything we take for granted when we walk through the doors into an AA meeting are

things which have been handed down from the people before us who adopted it from the people before them! The format of our meetings, how we become an AA member, how we handle our business (e.g., the handling of money), how we relate to others outside our AA society and all the other details which comprise the nitty-gritty of meetings did not appear out of thin air but through the long process of trial and error, and the handing down of that information through fellowship of AA.

The principles which guide this "handing down" can be found in the 12 Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous. Bill Wilson laid out the "Twelve Suggested Points" in Grapevine articles from 1946 (April) to 1948 (November). At the first International Convention in Cleveland in 1950 they were adopted as the Twelve Traditions.

Bill realized that sobriety rested on the existence of AA and that AA had to be protected from the fallibility of individuals and the threats of continued on page three

outside forces. Each recovering individual needed a strong and unified AA fellowship to stay sober. Bill also recognized that the creation of tradition was an ongoing process, and it was his hope that it would not stop. Bill recommends that we in AA should always be careful to stay away rules prohibitions from and (especially those that might discourage newcomers) so that the letter of the law does not crush the spirit of sobriety. This sentiment is our found Third in Tradition requirement for AA membership: you need only want to stop drinking to become an AA member.

PASS THE BASKET, PLEASE!

The long form of the 7th Tradition charges AA groups to fully support themselves by the voluntary contributions of their members. This is what we usually think of when the tradition comes to mind. The long form also lays out two additional principles: the danger of solicitation of money

using the name of AA, and the "unwiseness" (my coined term) of accepting large gifts or gifts with "obligations." The tradition establishes that AA needs money to exist and that financial support should come exclusively from AA sources.

My personal experience handling AA money at the group, district, and service area level confirms that AA adheres to these principles and is careful and thorough in handling the funds that come to AA from its members. A great deal of time and effort is expended to ensure that contributions are carefully recorded, deposited, and recognized.

We in AA come to realize that finance is necessary for the program to function. Ebby carried the message to Bill and spent a little money using the telephone to talk with him and to ride the subway to meet Bill in person. Bill W. came to recognize that Ebby established the principle that AA in action calls for the sacrifice of much time and a little money."

The Home Group

One of the things that people almost always recommend to the newcomer is to find a group that you are comfortable in and that knows you. Some groups keep a record of you as a home group member and others just assume (or hear from you) that the group is your sober "home."

The home group makes you accountable to it because you regularly attend and help to keep it "going." I have heard people say that you can tell if a meeting is your home group when home group members want to know where you were when you were not there. At my home group I learned that I was accountable to the group and the group counted on me to support it.

Regular attendance and a willingness to share will let people know who you are – your weaknesses, your strengths, your personality. And you find an environment that promotes sobriety



and a sober lifestyle.
