YOU BET YOUR LIFE

When I was young in the 50s there was a game show hosted by Groucho Marx called 'You Bet Your Life'.

If you said the magic word a parrot (not real) dropped down out of the sky, and you won a prize.

OK. I know I'm dating



myself, but I understand there's a reboot with Jay Leno. Yeah. I'm an old guy but I will play the old guy card if I can get an edge from it.

My son came back from college and said he had a professor that was so old that he was sure I was born, he was born, and we shook hands and invented dirt. And that was many years ago. I had to assure him I did not ride to school on a brontosaur. Although my grandfather did kill the last one. Kids are such a joy...sometimes. They tell me you should listen to your body. But mine just points at me and laughs. And my guardian angel is in therapy. But there is a magic word. It's 'meetings'. I'm not sure how the magic works but at every meeting I've ever been to I get a prize. helping another Sometimes it's struggling alcoholic. Sometimes it's something I hear that helps me stay sober and sometimes it's learning deep lessons about life. But I've never gotten those prizes by skipping a meeting. I feel guilty every time I miss one. I've

tried to understand why those meetings are such an important part of my life. But they just are. I have a friend that has instructed his wife that every time he's acting squirrelly to say, 'Go to a meeting'. There is certainly something magical about them. Maybe it's God's presence. 'Whenever two or more are gathered, etc. Of course, it may cost you a buck but it's the cheapest therapy session I've ever had.

The big book talks a lot about meetings. It's integral to the program. I'm in a big discussion meeting and surprising how often meetings are mentioned. The support they provide, the best defense against that first drink and the twelve step work you can do just by being there. Virtual meetings are better than nothing, as we found out during the pandemic. But face to face, handshaking, the looks around the room was missing somehow. At least for me. I'm so glad they're back in person again although we've lost a lot of attendance which I don't understand. When I've seen someone with a lot of tattoos and say, 'Didn't it hurt?' and they say 'Yes', I say 'I try not to do things that hurt'. It hurts not to go to meetings. It hurts you and it hurts others. And you know what's the worst thing that could happen if you don't go to meetings?

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continued from page three Nothing. That's the same worst thing that could happen if you took that first drink.

After a meeting, I was talking to someone who gave the lead. They had gone back out and nothing happened. And the time after that nothing happened. But within a few months they were back as bad as they had ever been getting DUIs, losing the respect of their family and friends and suffering the same physical problems they had had before. Just because it doesn't happen right away doesn't mean it's good for you. So, get back to those meetings if you've missed a few. You'll enjoy them, other people need you and you'll keep growing. Do you need to go to meetings? You bet your life.

I am not a big God person and often describe myself as an agnostic. I kept this to myself for my early years, but later found some comfort in finding others who shared by "belief." I was even more comforted when I read what Fr. Ed Dowling said at the 1955 AA Convention when he called all present "agnostic" (*Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age*, p. 254 at the bottom).

It's no surprise that most everybody I encounter in an AA meeting has some sort of higher power which they most often describe as God. When I hear "God" I sometimes think "good orderly direction" or one of the other AA truisms. I have my own version of g.o.d—"getting over drinking!

However, I try hard to learn from everybody that I come in contact with and try to keep what lack of interest I may have in their individual beliefs (the God of *their* understanding) from affecting the good I might hear. Bill W. recommended that we be quick to learn from others and put that learning to use in our lives. I do place great emphasis on the big words I encounter—faith, honesty, perseverance, selflessness, to name a few. A couple of examples follow. *continued on page five*

I once attended an annual open meeting that was regularly attended by hundreds. The speaker was a member of a religious order who ended her talk with her description of her Higher Power she called God. She described

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him/her as welcoming all at death with open arms as she opened wide her arms to the audience. A loving mother/father welcoming all homeeverybody, no exceptions. That image

will never leave me.

In another instance, I regularly attended a meeting where one of the regulars would bring his baby daughter. We attended the meeting together for so long she would eventually move from his arm to walking in at her father's hand. The image I remember was a man who held his infant daughter in the nook of one arm and raised his other hand toward heaven with palm up. Benny (not his real name) would say that he was "re-connected." He wouldn't say more than that and many times said nothing but simply cradled his daughter and raised his uplifted palm toward the sky.

Their belief crafted their views and actions, and I was affected by their words and presence. And though I was never to see their higher power I was able to witness their faith in word and action.


And doing service work outside the group ensures that the AA message is carried and available to everybody who wants it. The District web page says it nicely:


